History of maths


The study of complex mathematics was not found until around 3000 BC. The use of arithmetic, algebra and geometry was made by **Babylonians and Egyptians** for building and construction, as well as for astronomy. At the beginning of the 6th Century BC, Greek mathematics was introduced by the ancient Greeks.




An Architect is an expert in designing buildings by drawing plans and making models, considering what the building will be for and who the users will be

This picture shows an example of how an inverted curve has been used to create a brick arch. These arches can be found on the top floor of an apartment building in Barcelona called Casa Mila, which was designed by the Spanish architect Antonio Gaudi.









Maths is crucial! There isn't a day that goes by when you won't use maths in one way or another.

When cooking, for example. you mav need to double or halve a recipe, or add 2/3rds of the flour at the start and then the rest later. You mostly do this "by eye" but it is sound mathematical understanding which enables this skill.

Just look at how much maths is required for this simple brownie recipe!











Maths In A Brownie Recipe!



lngredients
butter 100g, chopped
dark chocolate 200g, chopped
eggs 4
golden caster sugar 250g
plain flour 100g
baking powder 1 tsp
cocoa 30g

Recipe

STEP 1

Heat the oven to 180C/fan 160C/gas 4.

STEP 2

Line a 22cm square brownie tin with baking parchment. Melt the butter and chocolate together in a microwave or in a bowl set over a pan of simmering water. Cool to room temperature.

STEP 3

Whisk the eggs and sugar together until the mixture is light and fluffy.

STEP 4

Fold the chocolate mixture into the egg mixture and sift on the flour, baking powder and cocoa.

STEP 5


Fold this in to give a fudgy batter.

STEP 6

(To ramp it up, add 100g chopped white or milk chocolate chunks OR 100g toasted, roughly chopped hazelnuts or pecans OR 2 handfuls of baby marshmallows.)

STEP 7

Bake for 25-30 minutes or until the top is cracked but the middle just set. Cool completely, then lift out of the tin and cut.

The founding father of modern French education has to be Jules Ferry. This French foreign minister of the 1870s is remembered for making education free, secular (laïque) and compulsory for both boys and girls from 6 to 13, and training non-religious teachers for the classrooms.

All French tests/exams are marked out of 20. Ten out of 20, called *la moyenne*, and anything above, is a pass, required in each subject.



Many of us have utilised our time off over the Summer to travel abroad but not one of us will have done so on an electric aircraft! In fact, electric passenger planes are many years in the future.


With the switch to electric passenger craft many years off, focus has switched to creating carbon neutral fuel.



Recent breakthroughs in technology have enabled scientists to use sunlight, carbon dioxide and water vapour captured from air to produce kerosene suitable for fueling airplanes.

As the fuel is made using solar energy and absorbs carbon dioxide from the atmosphere it will only release the same amount back into the air. The fuel is therefore considered carbon neutral. This could ensure mass air travel can continue for the foreseeable future. Leaving us no worries about getting away!






Over the course of last year, the science club students threw themselves into a range of challenges and activities from pond dipping to rocket launching and everything inbetween.



Schools can encourage parents to use Ofsted Parent View to give the views on a school either during an inspection or at any other time of the year.

HOW TO IMPROVE THE SLEEP OF YOUR STUDENTS

In Autumn last year, we launched our new Teen Sleep Hub, as part of our Teen Sleep Matters campaign, and it has been an amazing success so far with so many of you getting involved in sharing the information we supplied. We have also had lots of support from the Mental Health Foundation and Royal Society for Public Health.

Covid-19 continues to impact on the health and wellbeing of young people, in particularly around their sleep and mental health. Even with the return to school, we are still living in uncertain times and young people are still suffering with isolation, learning at hon with bubble closures, out-of-school activities suspended and routines being altered dramatically, it has been, and remains, extremely challenging.

Since we last made contact we have been working hard to continue to push this campaign and we have now launched a Live Chat service on our Teen Sleep Hub. This facility is available on Tuesday and Thursdays from 6-8pm so young people can chat about any issues they are having with their sleep with one of our trained sleep practitioners. Please do direct your students to this and even inform parents of this service

In this second pack you will find

- A selection of NEW posters promoting the Live Chat that can be emailed out to students and parents and, when normality resumes, can be printed and put up in classrooms, toilet facilities and other communal areas
- Social media graphics that you can use on your social channels and website to direct students and parents to the Teen Sleep Hub

As a reminder, the Teen Sleep Hub is a hive of information around sleep aimed at teens (not their parents) and includes a downloadable eBook and a series of top tips videos. We were supported on this project by our amazing Youth Advisory Panel, made up of young people aged between 13 and 19, across the country. It has been a great success so far with er 17,000 downloads of the eBook, proving that young people want the knowledge to help them improve their sleep.
