Dannie's career has predominantly focused on health and wellbeing, due to her working in the NHS for the last six years.



Black History Month - Pablo Fanque



Have you ever heard of the first Black British circus owner who inspired a Beatles tune? Maybe not, but I hope that by the end of this article you will know about him and his link to Leeds.

Pablo Fanque, who was born in Norwich in 1810, was a British Equestrian performer and circus proprietor. Pablo's real name was William Darby. He became the first recorded Black circus owner in Britain. His circus was popular in Victoria Britain for 30 years. Pablo became well respected throughout his career, later inspiring the Beatles to write a song based on him. The song features on the 'Sergeant Peppers Lonely Hearts Club Band' album and is called 'Being for the benefit of Mr Kite.'



As a young adult, Pablo trained every day, perfecting his skills as an equestrian. He owned thirty horses, training each of them to Waltz in time with the music, which had never been done before.

As well as being a good businessman, Pablo was also an exceedingly kind man. He gave most of the money made from his performance to charity.

Many of Pablo's shows were held in Leeds, and often he would perform himself. His first appearance in Leeds was with a circus called the Batty Troupe. He went on to manage his own circus and performed in Leeds on multiple occasions, including Woodhouse Moor; he was later buried here.

After Fanque's death, the chaplain of the Showman's Guild remarked: "In the great brotherhood of the equestrian world, there is no colour line" This goes to show that no matter your background, race, or colour, you can do anything. Without Pablo Franque, white men would have dominated the circus industry. Pablo took one of the

first steps to creating equality in the workplace.

Personally, I believe this was a very educational experience for both children and parents and in future could make an exceptional school trip for anyone learning about the topic!







Fuel Prices





As we can see in this graph, petrol prices, in the past 18 years, have had a dramatic increase.

In 2004, the price of fuel (per litre) was 80p, but it has now skyrocketed to being over £3.20! Of course, this graph was made at the start of 2022, before the invasion of Ukraine by Russia.

Once the war broke out, the government in the UK, EU, U.S and Canada decided to stop buying oil from Russia to avoid financially supporting their actions.

As Russia was one of our key oil providers, this meant that the resource would be scarcer and, therefore, make products including oil more expensive for customers – this affected the price of petrol and heating, amongst other things.

Of course, if this is the case for the UK and other countries, how come the U.S hasn't been affected nearly as much(?), you might be wondering.

You *could* point fingers at how the U.S has much more natural oil than the UK, but the main reason is tax.

On top of the extra 20% VAT (£1.22 per gallon) for petrol in the UK, you also have to pay for 'fuel duty'.


In the U.S, however, the tax for petrol is only 24.4 cents per gallon (A sales tax of 5.09% on average), which is much less than it is in the UK.

Fun Tax Facts!

Americans with lower income jobs (below 5 digit salary) pay 12.2% more 'payroll' tax than those with salaries above 5 digits (??,???) - a payroll tax is a percentage of a worker's salary that is given back to their employers - look at this graph for proof!

RESTART A HEART DAY



Our Year 7 students were all trained in the vital skill of CPR today. An alliance of partners all over the world (including UK Ambulance Services, Universities, and other charitable and public sector community-based organisations and first aid training organisations) came together to increase public awareness of cardiac arrests and increase the number of people trained in life saving CPR. They do this by organising and facilitating training events including fantastic work in schools.

Did you know survival rates from out of hospital cardiac arrest remain stubbornly low in the UK, with fewer than one in ten people surviving? At BBG we feel we have a key role to play in improving survival rates from out-of-hospital cardiac arrest and ensuring that everyone has a chance to learn CPR and that those having a sudden cardiac arrest have their best chance of surviving. Almost all of our students in the academy will now have had essential training and may just be the difference!

We were so impressed with the attitude and approach of our young people and very grateful to our providers for delivering such engaging and



Cardiopulmonary resuscitation, or CPR for short, is a simple life-saving technique given to someone in cardiac arrest. It aims to take over the job o the heart and lungs by keeping blood and oxygen flowing through the body



The Community Champions are a determined bunch though, and recognise that it is their social responsibility to contribute.

On Thursday of this week, 5 Community Champions: Evie Hustler, Tyler Young, Darcey Burgham, Chloe Rhodes and Jessica Wright attended the Kirklees Youth Climate Festival in Batley.

Along with representatives from around 10 other schools from North Kirklees, the students took part in discussions, activities and projects which were organised to help them think about what we are doing well as a school already, and what our areas of development need to be. They came home with lists of ideas, plans and useful contacts, and can't wait for the next step of our eco-journey.



One of the most useful parts of the day for us was the opportunity to speak to students and teachers from Upper Batley High School, who are much further along the eco journey than we are. They were recently awarded a Green Flag with Distinction for their innovative eco-programme, which includes keeping bees, growing fruit in the school orchards, having termly sustainability challenges, rewarding students who walk to and from school and students being offered their own plot of land to grow crops to sell for profit.



Did you know that each year the world sends as much waste to landfill sites to equal the height of two Mount Everests? Kirklees alone could fill the John Smith Stadium twice with the amount of waste which is not recycled. Kirklees no longer has landfill sites; instead our waste is incinerated, and the incinerators are used to fuel a turbine which produces electricity for the national grid.

The Kirklees recycling team are very keen to come along to BBG and talk to us about how we can recycle our waste without it costing a fortune and taking up a lot of time.



They day finished with a visit from the Batley and Spen Member of Parliament, Kim Leadbeater, who was buzzing as she spoke to the "BBG Massive" (her nickname for our team!) about their plans, and gave the students even more advice and offered to help if the students wrote to her office with their plans.


Black History Month

HOW TO IMPROVE THE SLEEP OF YOUR STUDENTS

In Autumn last year, we launched our new Teen Sleep Hub, as part of our Teen Sleep Matters campaign, and it has been an amazing success so far with so many of you getting involved in sharing the information we supplied. We have also had lots of support from the Mental Health Foundation and Royal Society for Public Health.

Covid-19 continues to impact on the health and wellbeing of young people, in particularly around their sleep and mental health. Even with the return to school, we are still living in uncertain times and young people are still suffering with isolation, learning at hon with bubble closures, out-of-school activities suspended and routines being altered dramatically, it has been, and remains, extremely challenging.

Since we last made contact we have been working hard to continue to push this campaign and we have now launched a Live Chat service on our Teen Sleep Hub. This facility is available on Tuesday and Thursdays from 6-8pm so young people can chat about any issues they are having with their sleep with one of our trained sleep practitioners. Please do direct your students to this and even inform parents of this service

In this second pack you will find

- A selection of NEW posters promoting the Live Chat that can be emailed out to students and parents and, when normality resumes, can be printed and put up in classrooms, toilet facilities and other communal areas
- Social media graphics that you can use on your social channels and website to direct students and parents to the Teen Sleep Hub

As a reminder, the Teen Sleep Hub is a hive of information around sleep aimed at teens (not their parents) and includes a downloadable eBook and a series of top tips videos. We were supported on this project by our amazing Youth Advisory Panel, made up of young people aged between 13 and 19, across the country. It has been a great success so far with er 17,000 downloads of the eBook, proving that young people want the knowledge to help them improve their sleep.


