



It is a truth universally acknowledged that any event concerning a celebrity recorded by *anyone* must and will be spread on the internet and, subsequently, made fun of. 
2: Liz Truss' resignation, and how that somehow links to Taylor Swift



Year 9 Travel Writing

This half term Year 9 students are learning how to write: blogs, vlogs, brochures and firsthand accounts about travel.

They have analyzed texts by Bill Bryson and texts about extreme travel like *Touching the Void* and *127 hours*. They have read about our capital city: London, wonders of the world: Stone Henge and Caribbean Islands. Nazarri Lehus came to BBG from the Ukraine last summer not speaking any English. Below are two examples of travel writing he has completed in lessons this half term.

Albania

I was very happy when I flew to Albania because it was the first flight in an airplane. When we were already at the bottom, I saw the sea. As soon as we arrived, we immediately went to the beach, and then to the room the next day we went to the city of Vlore, settled there and spent the whole day on the beach. The beaches there are like in the pictures of the Maldives, very beautiful water and the beach we beat on many beaches, but most of all I liked the beach called jeeps the beach there I was on a sea hunt,

after that beach we went to a hotel near the sea where there was a beautiful view. I forgot to say about one important thing, that there were a lot of bunkers all over Albania. If you go up the mountain, you can see a lot of military pillboxes of World War 2, which no one ever used, but there were 3 very interesting bunkers for the whole of Vlora, these three bunkers in the sea for submarines and it seemed that one of them was 2 kilometres away from us and we decided to go there. The submarine bunker was made in the rock and it could only be seen from the sea, but you could go down and see what it turned out to be, that there were large hermetic doors in the water and for people, too, hermetic only in the form of a large

hatch that was half open into it. I had to go in, but my dad and I didn't dare because it could appear in the local newspaper. Two fools went into the bunker of the Second World War and disappeared, so we looked and left. After that we went to the beach for two days and on the third day we went home.



HOW I GOT TO THE UK



It was on the morning of February 24 at 7:20 my mother woke me up and said that the war had begun, adding that I might not go to school.

In Ukraine, the attack was already predicted on February 14th 2021.

We had a place where we could go for this case.

On the first day we left for the Kyiv region, and the next morning we drove 260 kilometres from Kyiv to a city called Khmelnytsky where we stayed for 2 weeks with my dad's friends.

After, we went to the city of Lvov and stayed there for 2 days.

On the 3rd day, friends called my mother and said that there are buses that could take us to Poland.

We decided that we would go and arrived in Poland on the same day.

At 2 a.m. we were settled in temporary housing, and at 6 a.m. we were taken to the city of Krakow by that time there were already with my mother's acquaintance who also helped a lot.

We lived in Krakow for 2 weeks and then moved to the smaller town of Swadzens where we lived for 2 months and I went to a Polish school for a month.

While living in Poland, my mother found a sponsor, we issued a visa and flew to the UK and we have been here for 7 and a half months.

Students this week have covered a varied and diverse range of topics amongst the year groups. In Year 7 students have started to explore life in an extreme environment, in particular they are focusing on Antarctica. Last week they learnt that the lowest temperature ever recorded there was a freezing -89 degrees Celsius!

Year 9



Year 9 students are making an end of their exploration as 'tourists' around the world! Last week they were learning about sustainable tourism in Thailand, and making important decisions on the governments behalf to maintain tourism alongside the environment. This week students are looking at a less favourable type of tourism – Slum Tourism! Students will be looking at the positives and negatives of this type of tourism for the slum dwellers.

Year 10 students are smashing their Paper 2, Question 1 topic – Urban Environments. They are coming to the end of this topic, after learning in depth about regeneration in our capital city London! Students have discovered that the chosen site for the Olympic Park (2012) was once a 'hub' in the 19th Century for trade and factories along the River Thames! Unfortunately, the area then was labelled as the most deprived borough in England in 2004 due to mass decline and neglect... but then the Olympic Park aimed to change this and saw mass investment into the area.

Year 11


Finally, our lovely Year 11s are continuing their hard work as we finish the final topic for Paper 2, The Economic World! This now means that the majority of our lessons from here until the exams will be given to revision. The department are going to focus this revision on exam skills, allowing our students to 'practise, practise, practise!'.





This week students in KS3 have taken time out of their regular curriculum to learn about Holocaust Memorial Day (HMD), which this year will be taking place on Friday 27 January. Each year HMD receives a different theme, and the theme this year is 'Ordinary People', and how they either participated in, or responded to, events happening around them during the early 1930s.

Students have engaged with this content with a respectful attitude. After recapping what the Holocaust was, students started to think about if such evil acts could have been carried out against ordinary people by other ordinary people. Students first of all examined images of notable people from the Holocaust and tried to draw conclusions from that one picture, before reading a fact file about that person and their actions in history. In the case of students who studied Irma Grese, (the work shows below), students discovered that what they initially thought to be a kind looking, pretty young woman turned out to be a vicious SS guard who maltreated prisoners and enthusiastically subscribed to Nazi values.

Recipe of the week...

Flamiche

Try this French dish that's halfway between a pizza and a quiche.

Ingredients

- 250g strong white bread flour, plus extra for dusting
- 5g salt
- 5g fast-action dried yeast
- 2 tbsp olive oil, for the bowl
- 20g butter
- 500g leeks, white and pale green part only, thinly sliced
- 2 eggs, beaten
- 150g crème fraîche or soured cream
- 80g comté, gruyère or cheddar (use cheddar for vegetarians), grated
- 1 large thyme or rosemary sprig, leaves picked
- ¼ whole nutmeg, grated
- 20g parmesan or vegetarian alternative, grated
- salad, to serve (optional)



STEP 1

Mix the flour and salt together in a large bowl. Mix the yeast with 175ml warm water and leave for 5 mins to froth just a little, then add to the flour and mix vigorously with a metal spoon. Knead the dough as soon as it comes together on a lightly floured surface for around 5 mins until smooth. Alternatively, use a mixer fitted with a dough hook, working the dough for around 5 mins on medium speed, then adding the salt towards the end of the mixing time. Leave in a lightly oiled bowl covered with a clean, damp tea towel until nearly doubled in size, about 1 hr.

STEP 2


Meanwhile, heat the butter in a frying pan over a medium heat and cook the leeks until softened, about 8 mins. Don't let them colour. When soft, remove from the heat and leave to cool. Beat the eggs, crème fraîche, grated cheese, herbs and nutmeg together, and season well with plenty of pepper and some salt. Mix in the leeks.

STEP 3

Heat the oven to 220C/200C fan/gas 7. Line a 40 x 30cm baking tray with baking parchment. Lightly flour the work surface and roll the dough out to fit the baking sheet – it should be about 5mm thick. Make a small lip around the edge of the dough by folding the dough inward. Evenly spread the leek mixture over the dough, leaving a 1cm border. Sprinkle over the parmesan.


STEP 4

Cook the flamiche in the oven for around 25 mins until lightly golden on the top and the base is crisp. Remove from the oven, cut into squares and serve with salad, if you like.

Historical events in France and the Francophone world




26th January 1340 – English King Edward III proclaimed King of France.



-What do you have?




Year 9



Two other scientists, Watson and Crick were credited for the discovery and were awarded Noble prizes.




Year 7

HOW TO IMPROVE THE SLEEP OF YOUR STUDENTS

In Autumn last year, we launched our new Teen Sleep Hub, as part of our Teen Sleep Matters campaign, and it has been an amazing success so far with so many of you getting involved in sharing the information we supplied. We have also had lots of support from the Mental Health Foundation and Royal Society for Public Health.

Covid-19 continues to impact on the health and wellbeing of young people, in particular around their sleep and mental health. Even with the return to school, we are still living in uncertain times and young people are still suffering with isolation, learning at home with bubble closures, out-of-school activities suspended and routines being altered dramatically, it has been, and remains, extremely challenging.

Since we last made contact we have been working hard to continue to push this campaign and we have now launched a Live Chat service on our **Teen Sleep Hub**. This facility is available on Tuesday and Thursdays from 6-8pm so young people can chat about any issues they are having with their sleep with one of our trained sleep practitioners. Please do direct your students to this and even inform parents of this service.

In this second pack you will find

- A selection of NEW posters promoting the Live Chat that can be emailed out to students and parents and, when normally resumes, can be printed and put up in classrooms, toilet facilities and other communal areas
- Social media graphics that you can use on your social channels and website to direct students and parents to the Teen Sleep Hub

As a reminder, the Teen Sleep Hub is a hive of information around sleep aimed at teens (not their parents) and includes a downloadable eBook and a series of top tips videos. We were supported on this project by our amazing Youth Advisory Panel, made up of young people aged between 13 and 19, across the country. It has been a great success so far with over **17,000 downloads of the eBook**, proving that young people want the knowledge to help them improve their sleep.

12 Top Tips for BUILDING CYBER RESILIENCE AT HOME

As a society, we're increasingly using technology and tech services in the home. Digital assistants which can adjust the heating or turn lights on and off; streaming services for shows and movies on demand; games consoles; smart speakers; phones; laptops ... the list goes on. As we introduce each new gizmo to our homes, however, we increase the level of threat from cyber criminals. It's essential, therefore, that we learn to become more cyber resilient in relation to the devices and digital services that the people in our household use.

WHAT IS 'CYBER RESILIENCE'?

Cyber resilience focuses on three key areas: reducing the likelihood of a cyber attack gaining access to our accounts, devices or data; reducing the potential impact of a cyber incident; and making the recovery from a cyber attack easier, should we ever fall victim to one.

1. PASSWORDS: LONGER AND LESS PREDICTABLE

The longer, less common and predictable a password is, the more difficult it becomes for cyber criminals to crack. The National Cyber Security Centre's 'three random words' guidelines are ideal for creating a long password which is easy to remember but hard to guess.

2. AVOID RE-USING PASSWORDS

When you use the same password across different logins, your cyber resilience is only as strong as the security of the weakest site or service you've signed up for. If cyber criminals gain access to your username and password for one site or service, they'll definitely try them on others.

3. USE A PASSWORD MANAGER

A good way to juggle different passwords for every site or service you use is to have a password manager. This software stores all your passwords for you, so you simply need to remember the master password. LastPass, Dashlane, 1Password and Keeper are all excellent password managers.

4. BACK UP YOUR DATA

Keep a copy of your data using OneDrive, Google Drive or another reputable cloud-based storage solution. If it's extremely important or sensitive information, you could even decide to keep more than one back-up version – by saving it to a removable USB drive or similar device, for example.

5. ENABLE MULTI-FACTOR AUTHENTICATION (MFA)

Multi-factor authentication is where you need access to your phone (to receive a code, for example) or another source to confirm your identity. This makes it far more difficult for cyber criminals to gain entry to your accounts and your data, even if they do manage to get your username and password.

6. CHOOSE RECOVERY QUESTIONS WISELY

Some services let you set 'recovery questions' – such as your birthplace or a pet's name – in case you forget your password. Take care not to use information you might have mentioned (or are likely to in future) on social media. More unpredictable answers make cyber criminals' task far harder.

7. SET UP SECONDARY ACCOUNTS

Some services provide the facility to add secondary accounts, phone numbers and so on to help with potentially recovering your account. Make sure you set these up: they will be vital if you're having trouble logging in or if you're trying to take back control of your account after a cyber attack.

12. STAY SCEPTICAL

Cyber criminals commonly use various methods, including emails, text messages and social media posts. Be cautious of any messages or posts that are out of the ordinary, offer something too good to be true or emphasise urgency – even if they appear to come from someone you know.

11. KEEP HOME DEVICES UPDATED

Download official software updates for your household's mobile phones, laptops, consoles and other internet-enabled devices regularly. Security improvements and fixes are a key feature of these updates – so by ensuring each device is running the latest version, you're making them more secure.

10. CHANGE DEFAULT IOT PASSWORDS

Devices from the 'Internet of Things' (IoT), such as 'smart' home appliances, are often supplied with default passwords. This makes them quicker to set up, but also less secure – criminals can identify these standard passwords more easily, so change them on your IoT devices as soon as possible.

9. CHECK FOR BREACHES

You can check if your personal information has been involved in any known data breaches by entering your email address at www.haveibeenpwned.com (yes, that spelling is correct!). It's useful if you're worried about a possible attack – or simply as motivation to review your account security.

8. KEEP HAVING FUN WITH TECH

Consider our tips in relation to the gadgets and online services your household uses. Protect yourself and your family, and don't let the bad guys win: devices are not only integral to modern life but also a lot of fun – so as long as you keep safety and security in mind, don't stop enjoying your tech.
