

I remember BBG before the new building, and the first time I stepped in the new building - which I still maintain is a great addition to the academy.


I remember almost every P7 I had with Mr. Pashley, who is one of the greatest, supportive staff members I have had the pleasure to have help from.




BBG GALAXY

The 'Flipped Learning' Technique

Information for parents and carers




Flipped learning is the pre-lesson preparation, reflection and questioning that pupils undertake to help inform a teacher's planning (Mazur, 1997). Prior to a lesson, a teacher could direct students towards specific resources (often online media) that they need to digest and respond to.

Flipped learning will help stretch students' learning and understanding of topics, allow them time in the lesson to ask questions and make lessons more purposeful.

Research suggests that there have been some promising results from flipped learning where students have reported higher levels of satisfaction, greater engagement and consistent achievement.




What can you do?



Help your child identify the important information within a source, article or video and encourage them to write down questions about the areas of their learning that they do not fully understand, make notes on the topic or create a mind map.

Support your child to be proactive by thinking ahead and asking the teacher which topics are coming up next so they can actively start to understand them. Help your child take responsibility for their learning, prioritise their


work, set themselves targets and get into a good routine with out of school learning.

Chicken breast thin slices about 1cm thick

2 cloves garlic peeled chopped

- 1 teaspoon curry powder
- 1 teaspoon honey
- 1 tablespoon soy sauce
- 1 teaspoon oil (peanut or sunflower)
- 4 bamboo skewers (soaking in warm
- water before use)
- 3 pak or bok choy, sliced thinly 300g rice noodles, soaked in boiling water as per packet instructions

50ml coconut milk 50g desiccated coconut

1 red chilli, sliced into thin rings

A few leaves coriander

PEANUT SAUCE:

100ml coconut milk or fresh milk 3 tablespoons smooth peanut butter

2 tablespoons honey

1 tablespoon soy sauce

1/2 teaspoon curry powder

1 teaspoon oil (peanut or sunflower)

1 teaspoon corn flour

PEANUT CHICKEN AND NOODLES

PEANUT CHICKEN, PAK CHOY, COCONUT RICE NOODLES. YOU COULD ALSO USE TURKEY, PORK, BEEF OR TIGER PRAWNS FOR THIS RECIPE. SERVES 4.

MARINATE: Put the chicken with the garlic, curry powder, honey, soy sauce and oil in a bowl and mix well. Leave for about 30 minutes or longer.

You can soak the bamboo skewers for the same amount of time as the chicken marinates. Then skewer the chicken onto the bamboo skewers. Grill the chicken under a grill, fry in a pan or even on the BBQ on high heat. Cook each side for about 2 minutes or until the chicken is cooked and then serve with the warm peanut sauce.

MAKING PEANUT SAUCE:

Put all the ingredients for the peanut sauce into a small saucepan. Bring to a simmer on a low heat for about 2 to 3 minutes. Remove from the heat and serve

MAKING COCONUT NOODLES:

Pour the coconut milk into a saucepan and warm over a medium heat, adding the dessicated coconut.

Soak the noodles in boiling water and once softened, add to the coconut milk with the bok choy and coat the noodles.

Spoon into warm bowls and top with the skewers.

If you have any dry roasted peanuts, crush and serve them with sliced chilli and fresh coriander as a garnish, and maybe even a lime wedge for tanginess!

What an amazing achievement, well done Alex.

























Holocaust Memorial Day

Racism in media

Racism in media is something that we see every day; but do we notice it? In media, on TV, social media, many people do not find themselves represented enough. Why?

What does it look like?

The media seems fair to everyone, don't they? They take the best actresses and actors, they don't look at their skin colour or their background, right? It seems like they do not, but behind the screens they do, and we don't really notice it as it seems 'normal'?

TV programs are mostly concentrated on blonde-haired, white and/or light-skinned protagonists. When we think of a show like 'Love Island' most of the characters on the show are white, Caucasian. Furthermore, the media also normalises western

and heteronormative ideas and behaviours. Again Love Island has rejected requests to have gay participants. Representatives of Asian and Black communities have commented that: "their views of what their lives should be like are taken from what they see on TV and in media representation". In recent years advertising has stepped up and is more diverse and representative, however TV still has a long way to go. For example, how many soaps or series can you think of with a protagonist with Chinese heritage?

How does racism in media affect others?

Asian Americans, African Americans and many diverse cultures struggle with racial and ethnic identity development. With many saying that the lack of media representation negatively impacts their self-esteem and overall views of racial and cultural groups. Furthermore, community leaders have declared statements and mottos like: "it's hard to be what you can't see." As a result, many do not pursue careers or academic opportunities when they are not exposed to the possibilities ...

Social racism and Casual racism. Why do we not make it clear about the difficulties of causal racism?

What can we change?

Overall, we can see that the media does not represent all cultures and 'different' backgrounds equally. We can see, so why we do not speak! Are we afraid of damaging ourselves? We need to start raising awareness of the problem by posting about the challenges on social media and by talking to friends and spreading the message.

In addition to this, many marketing teams can help. Casting agencies can recruit people from diverse backgrounds and cultures.

Aviation

Ever since the outbreak of Covid-19, aviation and the aircraft industry haven't been quite as profitable as they once were. Travel restrictions and low demand for flights caused airlines to lose money by the day, and fewer people going abroad meant that many airlines were almost forced out of business.

As the pandemic is coming to an end (again), aviation could very well make a comeback in the world of transport. So, today, I decided to write about its effect on our world as it is today and how you can get involved.

<u>Jobs</u>

Pilot: The pilot is one of the highest paying jobs in aviation with an average salary of £150k. Their job is to control the aircraft and to keep all passengers and crew safe. However, the process of becoming a pilot isn't as simple as you might think. To fly a plane, of course, you need a license. And to get a license you need dozens of hours of flight training and tests to be able to legally fly a plane.

Flight Attendant: The flight attendants address the passengers' needs with food and drink, medical support if needed, and more. However, the salary for a flight attendant isn't very high, coming in at only £15-20,000 a year on average.

Airport Security: These people make sure that everyone at the airport is safe by making sure no illegal items are smuggled on the planes and by monitoring suspicious behaviour. Their salary starts at around £35k a year.

Q&A

How do I fly planes non-commercially?

If you have a private aircraft and a license, you can fly your own plane whenever you want. Some places, however, don't allow private aircraft to land, so make sure you've got a clear, legal route when taking to the skies. Here's a picture of me *actually* flying over Gomersal!

How old do I have to be to fly one?

Flying a plane requires lots of responsibility, skill and training, so you must be 18 years old to take your first steps in acquiring a license.

What steps do I have to take to become a pilot?

To become a commercial pilot, you need 2 licenses. 1 – An ATPL (Airline Transport Pilot License) and 2 – A Class 1 Medical Certificate. Training to become a pilot can cost anything between £70-120k and can take 16-18 months to complete.

To become a trainee, you need good GSCE passes in Maths, English and





Science (so make your schoolwork count) and it's also best to have A-Levels if you want to succeed.

To become a co-pilot or first officer you must graduate from flying school, but becoming a captain requires an extra 1,500 hours of flying experience.

You only get one go to complete the training to acquire your ATPL and, while it can be very expensive, there's never a guaranteed job at the end.

There's plenty more to explore in the world of aviation so my article has barely scratched the surface. I hope, however, that you'll leave having learnt something.

Appeal to raise £317,000 for Beau's cancer treatment in New York by May 2022



Beau is 5 years old. She is a kind, considerate and determined little girl with plenty of sass. In December 2020, she was diagnosed with stage 4 high-risk neuroblastoma, a rare aggressive childhood cancer that has a 40-50% chance of long-term survival at diagnosis.

High-risk neuroblastoma has a high relapse rate and if Beau's cancer does return, her chances of long-term survival would drop to less than 1 in 10.

Her family are fundraising for a clinical trial in New York that will aim to reduce the chances of her neuroblastoma coming back.





It aims to produce its first electric car within the next three years, with exclusively electric models by 2030.






ENGLISH LITERATURE FACTS 1822







CHARLES DICKENS

John Dickens was a clerk in the Royal Navy Pay Office at Portsmouth in Hampshire. He was later transferred to **London** and then to Chatham, returning to live in Camden Town in London in **1822** to work in Somerset House. John Dickens found it difficult to provide for his growing family on his meagre income. Soon his debts had become so severe that all the household goods were sold in an attempt to pay his bills, including furniture and silverware. He had **eight children** in all, his second-oldest was **Charles Dickens**.

John's debts became too much and he was **put in prison** for debtors. This predicament caused Charles to **leave school at the age of twelve** to work in a factory, as he had become **'the man of the house'** and the **breadwinner** in his father's absence. Dickens even had to sell his beloved childhood books to try and raise funds.



Year 7

After reflecting on our murder mystery report "Who Killed the Krill?", Year 7 Geographers had an opportunity to compare their justifications. Many of us agreed that Fishermen Fred caused a lot of chaos for the food web, however Belinda Blue Whale was another popular choice as most guilty. It has been interesting to hear different opinions and reasoning in our classrooms.



We debated whether Belinda eating 3,600kg of krill per day in the feeding season of Spring would reduce krill numbers more than Fisherman Fred's actions, who catches 100,000 tons of krill per year on his boat. If we compare these two suspects, Belinda Blue Whale eats 16 tons of krill per day, totaling approximately 1,920 tons per year. This would mean that Fisherman Fred is most to blame for killing the krill!

Year 8

Continuing to explore the Power of the Earth, this week we have looked at composite and shield volcanoes. First, we identified where volcanoes are located worldwide, with the majority being found along plate margins and the Ring of Fire of the Pacific Ocean in particular. To understand the different characteristics of composite and shield volcanoes, we applied our previous learning about plate margins. Composite volcanoes are found on destructive plate margins whereas shield volcanoes occur on constructive plate margins. There are differences in viscosity of their magma, as well as their shape. Next week we will investigate a volcanic eruption case study!



This week brings an end to our topic 'Becoming a Global Citizen', we have been so impressed with the cultural capital our Year 9 Geographers have shown; lots of students have agreed that human impacts on marine ecosystems is out of control and it is our responsibility to ensure there is sustainable ocean life for our future. Some students have discussed reasons why NGOs like Greenpeace produce adverts to raise awareness for plastic pollution and then we had a go at creating our own awareness campaigns. Students who used a slogan, images and facts about the amount of plastic pollution in the ocean had the most eye-catching adverts.


We investigated what humans can do differently to reduce ocean pollution and added these helpful tips onto our awareness adverts.

Did you know, 4000 fewer tonnes of plastic enters the ocean each year due to the UK ban on micro plastics – a small step towards big change!



Year 10

Continuing to learn about weather hazards as part of the Challenge of Natural Hazards topic, Year 10 GCSE students have been learning about the UK's unique positioning in our world, whereby six major air masses meet at our shores, bringing a variety of frontal weather with them. Continental air masses originate over land and maritime air masses originate over sea; depending on compass direction, these are Arctic, Polar and Tropical impacting the UK, however Equatorial and Antarctic air masses also occur on Earth. Next week we will investigate how the extreme weather event the Beast from the East impacted the UK!



Year 11

GEOGRAPHY REVISION

Revision continues for Year 11 students, addressing structure of longer written answers as well as recapping the main case studies for the Paper 2 Urban Issues and Challenges. Students have been set a 9 mark question as part of their weekly homework tasks. We are really looking forward to seeing the improvements they have made to their writing structure to access the higher evaluative marks. It is important that Year 11 continue working hard on their retrieval of GCSE content, both in the classroom and independently.

As part of our vertical curriculum, all students in KS3 have this week engaged with Holocaust Memorial Day and this year's theme 'One Day' through lessons and assemblies. Students have been encouraged to reflect on how 'One Day' can mean a number of things to us. There is 'One Day' for Holocaust Memorial Day, 27th January, in which we learn about the Holocaust, Nazi Persecution and the genocides that followed in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur, in the hope that there may be 'One Day' in the future with no genocide. We can consider 'One Day' in history or 'One Day' when life changed. Survivors of the Holocaust and of genocide often talk about the 'One Day' when everything changed, sometimes for the worse and sometimes for better. 'One Day' at a time can be a further reflection of victims that had to keep going through each and every day, such as in 1994 Rwandan genocide which lasted 100 days. Our History curriculum aims to enable students to become productive and active members of society that understand the world we live in and how to take an active part in it. Key messages this week encouraged students to consider the lessons that can be learned from these events and how the world should respond to a modern refugee crisis such as Rohingya children from Myanmar.






Some of our lessons this week focussed on the story of Henry Wuga. According to Henry, (top right) his life changed on November 9th 1938 when like many Jews, he no longer felt safe because of Kristallnacht. This '**One Day**' changed Henry's life and he was sent to Britain as part of a programme known as the Kindertransport, which translates as 'Children's transport'. This humanitarian programme ran between November 1938 and September 1939, rescuing 10,000 from Nazi persecution.

Four Men in Hats

Costly & Catastrophic Maths Mistakes Amsterdam City Council's €188 Million Housing Benefits Error

Amazing
Geometry in the tulip fields in Amsterdam

In December 2013, the finance office of the Amsterdam city council sent out €188 million to over 10,000 poor families living in the city. The city later discovered that it had made an error in the payments.

It originally planned to send €1.8 million and not €188 million.

The payment software was programmed in cents and not euros.

People received €15,500 instead of €155 and, in one case, €34,000 instead of €340.

Luckily, the city had been able to recover all of the money except for €2.4 million at the time the error was revealed in the news. It was expected that the city would have a hard time recovering €1.2 million of that. That is a substantial amount, along with the €300,000 the city had already spent on rectifying the calamity.








A couple of years ago, Harriet Clark (who is always looking for a new challenge) auditioned for the children's programme at Opera North. She didn't know very much about opera at the time, but Harriet is always open to new things and thought this sounded interesting. Harriet's first opera performances were in Pucinni's *La Bohème* as part of the children's chorus. Fast forward to January 2022, and Harriet is about to embark on her first opera tour, with the Opera North Youth Company.

The company are performing an opera called *Brundibár* by Jewish composer Hans Krása. Originally written in German in 1938, it tells the story of two children, whose plan to help their sick mother finds them up against an evil street busker.

However, the story behind the opera is as interesting as the story within the piece. It was originally performed in secret by children in a Jewish orphanage in Prague. Hans Krása was deported to the Terezín concentration camp in 1942, and in 1943 the score and libretto (the music and words) were smuggled into the camp. Krása re-orchestrated the opera and the Terezín version was first performed in the Magdeburg barracks.

The Nazi party soon realised that they could use this enormously popular performance to their advantage, and it was recorded for a propaganda film, and also performed when the international Red Cross carried out an inspection of the Terezín camp in 1944. There were 55 performances in the camp, before the prisoners began to be transported to other camps such as Auschwitz and the opera was performed no more.









We wish Harriet all the best with her performance, and are looking forward to hopefully watching her in one of the local performances.











Year 11 have still been learning about waves this week. During lessons they have also been completing the required practicals to calculate wave speed. The difficulty with measuring waves is that they move, can be invisible and are very fast, but with some clever technology we are able to measure the frequency and wavelength of the water in the ripple tank. I'm not sure how this was achieved before everybody always had a camera in pockets. To measure the wavelength a photograph needs to be taken to stop the waves moving, we ensure a ruler is placed in the frame to keep the scale. To measure the frequency, we need to slow down the waves, this is achieved using the slow-motion camera.

Science is an everevolving subject, and it is exciting to see our department is always willing to try something new. This week Mr Aindow prepared his class for the reaction time required practical by playing 'bat the rat'. A 'rat' was dropped down a piece of drainpipe and the aim was to time it so that it could be hit when it came out of the bottom of the drainpipe. There were varying degrees of success but plenty of resilience on display. The students then went on to complete the required the practical for ruler drop experiment.

Chinese New Year 2022 begins on Tuesday 1st February. It is the Year of the Tiger.




It is extremely popular to send family and friends red envelopes electronically, something that can be done through WeChat, China's most popular communications app.

LGBT+ History Month

LGBT+ History Month was initiated in the UK by Schools Out UK and first took place in February 2005. The event is intended to raise awareness of, and combat prejudice against, LGBT people and history.

Originally called 'gay and lesbian history', LGBTQ history emerged from the 1970s gay rights movements in the UK and USA. Since then, LGBTQ history has diversified to study the historical experiences and cultures of all sexual and gender minorities around the world. LGBTQ histories seek to challenge the stories we tell about identity and the creation of social norms, and ask questions about how we analyse the past.

MARSHA P. JOHNSON Gay liberation activist

Marsha P. Johnson, born and also known as Malcolm Michaels Jr., was an American gay liberation activist and self-identified drag queen.

She was an African American transgender-rights activist, whose work in the 1960s and 1970s had a huge impact on the LGBT+ community.

At this time, being gay was classified as a mental illness in the United States. Gay people were regularly threatened and beaten by police, and were shunned by many in society.

In June 1969, when Marsha was 23 years old, police raided a gay bar in New York called The Stonewall Inn. The police forced over 200 people out of the bar and onto the streets, and then used excessive violence against them. Marsha, who was living and working in New York at the time, was one of the key figures who stood up to the police during the raids. Marsha resisted arrest, but in the following days, led a series of protests and riots demanding rights for gay people

HOW TO IMPROVE THE SLEEP OF YOUR STUDENTS

In Autumn last year, we launched our new Teen Sleep Hub, as part of our Teen Sleep Matters campaign, and it has been an amazing success so far with so many of you getting involved in sharing the information we supplied. We have also had lots of support from the Mental Health Foundation and Royal Society for Public Health.

Covid-19 continues to impact on the health and wellbeing of young people, in particularly around their sleep and mental health. Even with the return to school, we are still living in uncertain times and young people are still suffering with isolation, learning at home with bubble closures, out-of-school activities suspended and routines being altered dramatically, it has been, and remains, extremely challenging.

Since we last made contact we have been working hard to continue to push this campaign and we have now launched a Live Chat service on our <u>Teen Sleep Hub.</u> This facility is available on Tuesday and Thursdays from 6-8pm so young people can chat about any issues they are having with their sleep with one of our trained sleep practitioners. Please do direct your students to this and even inform parents of this service.

In this second pack you will find

- A selection of NEW posters promoting the Live Chat that can be emailed out to students and parents and, when normality resumes, can be printed and put up in classrooms, toilet facilities and other communal areas
- Social media graphics that you can use on your social channels and website to direct students and parents to the Teen Sleep Hub

As a reminder, the Teen Sleep Hub is a hive of information around sleep aimed at teens (not their parents) and includes a downloadable eBook and a series of top tips videos. We were supported on this project by our amazing Youth Advisory Panel, made up of young people aged between 13 and 19, across the country. It has been a great success so far with over 17,000 downloads of the eBook, proving that young people want the knowledge to help them improve their sleep.


