Keani's signature bake was a 4 layer cake that has strawberries and cream filling, topped with homemade meringues, biscuits and more strawberries.


She has had a couple of baking disasters, namely some nut biscuits that she forgot to put flour and baking powder in!


Year 9 – coastal landscapes

Legislative Elections in France (in French: Élections législatives en France)

Legislative elections determine the Members of Parliament, who have the right to sit in the National Assembly, the lower house of the French Parliament. The elections will be held on 12 and 19 June this year, to elect the 577 members of the 16th National Assembly of the Fifth French Republic.


The presidential election was held in April this year. The politics of France takes place with the framework of a semi-presidential system determined by the French Constitution of the French Fifth Republic. The nation declared itself to be an "indivisible, secular, democratic, and social Republic". The constitution provides for a separation of powers and proclaims France's "attachment to the Rights of Man and the principles of National Sovereignty as defined by the Declaration of 1789."

The political system of France consists of an executive branch, a legislative branch, and a judicial branch.

- Executive power is exercised by the President of the Republic and the Government. The Government consists of the Prime Minister and the ministers. The Prime Minister is appointed by the President, and is responsible to Parliament. The government, including the Prime Minister, can be disbanded by the National Assembly, the lower house of Parliament, through a "censure motion".
- The Parliament of France is the legislative branch. Parliament consists of the National Assembly and the Senate. It passes statutes and votes on the budget; it controls the action of the executive through formal

questioning on the floor of the Houses of Parliament and by establishing commissions of inquiry. The constitutionality of the statutes is checked by the Constitutional Council, members of which are appointed by the President of the Republic, the President of the National Assembly, and the President of the Senate.


- The independent judiciary is based upon a civil law system which evolved from the Napoleonic Codes. The most distinctive feature of the French judicial system is that it is divided into judicial streams (dealing with civil law and criminal law) and administrative streams (dealing with appeals against executive decisions).
- France is a unitary state. However, its administrative subdivisions regions, departments and communes have various legal functions, and the national government is prohibited from intruding into their normal operations.
- France was a founding member of the European Coal and Steel Community, later the European Union. As such, France has transferred part of its sovereignty to European institutions, as provided by its constitution. The French government therefore has to abide by European treaties, directives, and regulations.



We're already looking forward to next year, and are planning our return to whole school performances. Watch out for news of when and where you can see our awesome students performing.



Well done Mrs Clough! We loved watching you perform!










Students were using their sharp intellects this week as they dissected hearts. They were challenged to identify as many chambers and major blood vessels as they could, having first labelled a diagram.

Schools can encourage parents to use Ofsted Parent View to give the views on a school either during an inspection or at any other time of the year.

HOW TO IMPROVE THE SLEEP OF YOUR STUDENTS

In Autumn last year, we launched our new Teen Sleep Hub, as part of our Teen Sleep Matters campaign, and it has been an amazing success so far with so many of you getting involved in sharing the information we supplied. We have also had lots of support from the Mental Health Foundation and Royal Society for Public Health.

Covid-19 continues to impact on the health and wellbeing of young people, in particularly around their sleep and mental health. Even with the return to school, we are still living in uncertain times and young people are still suffering with isolation, learning at hon with bubble closures, out-of-school activities suspended and routines being altered dramatically, it has been, and remains, extremely challenging.

Since we last made contact we have been working hard to continue to push this campaigr and we have now launched a Live Chat service on our Teen Sleep Hub. This facility is available on Tuesday and Thursdays from 6-8pm so young people can chat about any issues they are having with their sleep with one of our trained sleep practitioners. Please do direct your students to this and even inform parents of this service

In this second pack you will find

- A selection of NEW posters promoting the Live Chat that can be emailed out to students and parents and, when normality resumes, can be printed and put up in classrooms, toilet facilities and other communal areas
- Social media graphics that you can use on your social channels and website to direct students and parents to the Teen Sleep Hub

As a reminder, the Teen Sleep Hub is a hive of information around sleep aimed at teens (not their parents) and includes a downloadable eBook and a series of top tips videos. We were supported on this project by our amazing Youth Advisory Panel, made up of young people aged between 13 and 19, across the country. It has been a great success so far with er 17,000 downloads of the eBook, proving that young people want the knowledge to help them improve their sleep.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

Twitch is a livestreaming service which tends to focus on gaming. Users can publicly broadcast their gameplay and commentary online for other users to watch, it's a community-driven platform where viewers can support their favourite streamers' channels through PayPal donations, "Bits" and more. Each streamer or group creates their own community for fans to interact with each other. Twitch has more than 15 million daily active users and includes non-gaming topics such as music, cooking and art. Anyone can create a channel to livestream or watch videos.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

UNCENSORED STREAMS

Uncensored content obviously carries a greater risk of inappropriate language and behaviour (streamers can, however, list their broadcast as unsuitable for children). their broadcast as Unsultable for children,. Twitch has strict rules for streamers to follow, but requires viewers to report any streams which breach these guidelines. Each livestream is accompanied by a text chat which it is the streamer's responsibility to moderate.

CENSO

INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Most people are already aware that some video games feature adult content such violence, sexual content, profanity and so on. Twitch does prevent certain games from being streamed on the platform, but most are still allowed. It is relatively simple, then, for a child to find livestreams of games that aren't suitable for them – including horror games.

HIDDEN COSTS

Twitch is free to use because it's supported by advertisers. Removing the ads requires a subscription to Twitch Turbo – or the Twitch Prime package (free for anyone with an Amazon Prime account), which blocks the ads and offers additional goadles such as bonus games. Streamers earn most of their income by asking users for direct donations or gifts of the virtual currency Twitch Bits.

As well as streamers talking directly to their audience, Twitch enables viewers to use text chat to speak to the person they're watching. It's a social platform which also allows viewers to interact with each other via text while they are watching livestreams – including exchanging private messages. This raises the possibility of a child being approached and messaged online by total strangers.

WEBCAM SHARING

It's common for streamers to use their live webcam footage. This allows better interaction with their viewers, but also adds risk: the stream might include sponsored content or product placement that lish't child friendly. Using a webcam in livestreams increases the chance of malicious viewers finding out where the streamer lives and provides builles with visual reactions to their hurtful behaviour.

PRIVATE CHAT ROOMS

Twitch encourages streamers to create their own communities, which extend beyond its platform. Many create a public Discord group, for example, for viewers to join and communicate with each other. Discord is a completely separate entity to Twitch and offers a higher risk of predators, grooming and cyberbullying if your child gets involved in the voice or video chat with strangers.

Advice for Parents & Carers

EXPLORE IT YOURSELF

witch doesn't have any parental controls, but it is possible to lock troublesome users if it becomes necessary. The best olution is to watch some Twitch channels by yourself or with your hild to find some that are suitable. Watching some streams by ourself is also a good route to understanding the sort of content hat your child would be consuming regularly on Twitch.

LEARN HOW TO BLOCK


